Redbud Trail Rendezvous April 27-28, 2019

Forget the rain and snow flurries that stalled spring in Indiana this year. The Redbud Trail Rendezvous will bring frontier fun right on schedule April 27-28 at the Fulton County Historical Society. The location is four miles north of Rochester on U.S. 31 and 375 N. Tents will be set up south of the barn and Living History Village.

Saturday hours are 10-5 and Sunday hours are 10-4. Admission is \$3 for adults, and free for children age 11 and under. For more information, contact FCHS at 574-223-4436 or fchs@rtcol.com, www.fultoncountyhistory.org. Rain or Shine the festival will go on.

Since 1991, the Redbud Trail Rendezvous has brought fun history to northern Indiana. Often the first living history event of the spring, it portrays Indiana history from the Revolutionary War to the Civil War, making this a pre-1865 event. Tents will be set up and lived in for the weekend by re-enactors and traditional craftsmen who will demonstrate and talk to the public about frontier history and camping.

People dressed in authentic pre-1865 outfits demonstrate many traditional crafts. Crafts include flint knapping, beadwork, spinning and weaving, leather, watercolor painting, pewter casting, wood carving, blacksmith, scrimshaw, fingerweaving, and much more.

Foods cooked over wood fires will include ham and beans, vegetable stew, buffalo burgers, sassafras tea, and breakfast of biscuits and sausage gravy - Fulton County Historical Society booth; and homemade fudge and cookies - Mark Gropp, Orland, Ind.

Because activities at the museum Sat. morning, the north gate to the rendezvous will be by the round barn. Also at the south gate, located off Meridian Road, admission will be collected before they park. The Fulton County Museum, Round Barn Museum and some buildings in the Living History Village will be open for people to view.

Volunteers can earn free admission to the Redbud Trail Rendezvous by working half a day. To volunteer, call the museum at 574-223-4436. Free parking is provided on FCHS grounds. The grounds are handicapped accessible.

Mark Gropp, Orland, Ind., will open the show with his bagpipes at 10 a.m., playing from the porch of the General Store (green building). He sells homemade fudge.

Dale and Patty Pace, Rochester, will be in the William Polke house/stagecoach inn with flint knapping, wood working, water color paintings and fiber arts.

Again this year is a program tent with benches for the music and history presentations. On the schedule are Kim Hoover of Hoots & Howls with birds of prey – Sunday only, Marsha Hedger Glassburn with Cherokee stories, Mark and Liza Woolever with music and sing-along. James Wilson and group from the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War will share some history.

Robin Ozenbaugh and Garry Kelser will demonstrate loading and firing a muzzleloader, using powder but no lead, at their camp. During the Trail of Courage they use the shooting range but the Redbud Trail Rendezvous stays at the north end of the 35 acre FCHS grounds.

Robert Wolf and Tim Pearson, Lakeville, will demonstrate iron working in the blacksmith shop.

Traditional crafts include Tina Welty, Goshen – leather and dreamcatchers; Steve Whipker, Wabash - trade beads, quill and bead work; Bruce Eltzroth, Lagro, and Dana Farmer, Wabash – toys and games; Linda Fife, Delphi – spinning wheel; Steven Kirkpatrick, Edwardsburg – hand carved wood; David Kollar, South Bend - clothes, cast iron, pewter, horns and antlers, skins, coins; Garry LaBere, Walkerton – box; Craig Leitch, Ligonier – pioneer jewelry, walking sticks and knives; Michele Riggle, Kokomo – clothing, jewelry, blankets, toys; David Thomas, Goshen – bags, knives, bowls, moccasins, tin war; and Walter Pike, Lansing, Mich – open tipi and history...
